Research focus was in methodology

2009

 Did not develop a specific clinical focus during fellowship

2010

 Could not develop a patient cohort MISTAKE #1

Not developing a clinical area of focus

2008

(dancer not included)

2009

Assertive forthright style

Probably not the best fit for the company

MISTAKE #2

Not being able to establish a sponsor-protégé relationship

Afraid of his shadow

2008

Felt I wouldn't be recognized for my own achievements

 Was left working solo on many projects MISTAKE #3

Reached out to the CPG chair

Hard to work with

Argumentative, uncompromising

2008

Low motivation with declining productivity

2009

 No opportunity for advancement and recognition in my area of research


